# This Week, December 20 Tim Leopard Helps Build the Future at UA



Alumni and other visitors who have not been to the Capstone in many years could be forgiven for not knowing their way around. The University, of course,

has been growing aggressively in recent years under the leadership of Robert Witt, and along with that growth has come fundamenal change in the landscape of the campus.

On Tuesday, Rotarians will hear from one of the key players to have been involved in so much growth on the campus in recent years, **Tim Leopard.** He is the Assistant Vice President for Construction.

Leopard began working with the University as a consultant in 2004, and as an employee since 2006. He has worked in construction for 25 years and has supervised over \$2.5 billion dollars in construction projects, ranging from automobile plants and luxury condominiums to academic facilities, convention centers, and advanced treatment cancer centers. He has even constructed log cabins.

Currently, Mr. Leopard oversees the campus construction program. In that capacity he is responsible for a wide range of issues, from inception to completion of each project: alignment with the campus master plan, improving the living and learning environment for faculty and students, diminishing the impact of construction activities on the campus community, and providing projects that will provide the lowest overall lifecycle cost to the University.

# Last Week: December 13 TSO Director Adam Flatt



Rotarians were treated to the sounds of the season once again last week, when members of the Capstone Quartet of the Tuscaloosa Symphony Orchestra played some holiday favorites during lunch. But there was more. Adam Flatt, the new Director of the TSO, then spoke to the Club about how he came to Tuscaloosa, and what the Orchestra means to the city. **Rotarian Bruce Burrows** introduced the speaker.

Flatt had an unusual introduction to the community. Out of an original 150 applicants, he was the last of four finalists chosen to visit the city. On the day he was to make his case, a tornado warning forced him to do so in the basement of the Moody Music Building. But Flatt impressed even in those circumstances, and was soon offered the job.

He was immediately impressed with Tuscaloosa, the University, the facilities at Moody and the TSO and its leadership. He described what he found to be "an extraordinary level of musicianship" in our University town, and a musical support community that is "extraordinarily strong." So he has been able, from the beginning, to emphasize the highest level of quality and performance for the TSO.

And he has been able to do so with very modest resources. "I have never seen anywhere another nonprofit orchestra that is leaner," Flatt said. In his estimation we have by far the "best bang for the buck" in the nation, the highest quality performances for the least expense. He underscored the point with a striking comparison. The salary for four musicians of the Chicago symphony is well over the annual budget of the entire TSO!

Flatt also insists that as a community organization the TSO should be just as strong in reaching out to and enriching the lives of Tuscaloosa's citizens. The orchestra is "an instrument of the community," as he put it, and he cited as one of the best examples of that spirit the TSO's strong response to the trauma of the April 2011 storms. The TSO was not only part of the Bama Rising concert and the benefits held at the Tuscaloosa Amphitheater. They have also scheduled an upcoming concert for April, 2011, an original score that will serve as a fitting tribute to the heroes and a remembrance of the victims of last year.

Foote has also made up meetings in Greece, Egypt, England, Poland, Denmark and Mexico. He has two children, one stepchild, one grandson and another due in May. Rotarian **Lewis Carnes** is a native of Marietta Georgia. He came to Tuscaloosa in 1998 to attend the University of Alabama, After college he entered the Insurance business and currently works for Hull and Associates specializing in commercial insurance and bonds. **Rotarian Bruce Burrows** is graduate of The Citadel and has a Masters in History from the University of West Florida. He served both ground and air combat tours as a Marine officer in Vietnam. He flew 377 combat missions and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Vietnamese cross of gallantry, and sixteen air medals.
