

Jessica Davis Tagg, executive director of the Tuscaloosa Symphony Orchestra, has more than a decade of arts administration experience, having worked with groups such as the Illinois Symphony Orchestra, the Hot Springs Music Festival and the Tanglewood Festival.

She earned bachelor's and master's degrees in violin performance from the University of Georgia and Louisiana State University, respectively, and com-

pleted doctoral coursework in musicology at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. She has since become a certified music librarian and has focused much of her career on implementing and developing ways to help people deeply understand and enjoy orchestra concerts via community outreach and development.

Tagg was named executive director of the TSO in July 2013.

### Honor Flight

The fifth Tuscaloosa Rotary Honor Flight was a huge success, with 80 area World War II and Korean War veterans making the one-day trip to Washington, D.C., on Wednesday, Oct. 1, to visit the WWII, Korean, Vietnam, Iwo Jima, Lincoln and FDR memorials and Arlington National Cemetery.

"From my perspective, it was a perfect day, with true Rotary teamwork to make a dream come true for our heroes," said Honor Flight Committee chairman Jordan Plaster. "It was an honor to witness hundreds of people thanking our Honor Flight veterans for their service to our country."

A record crowd also turned out at the Tuscaloosa airport Wednesday night to welcome the veterans home, said Plaster, who thanked committee members, Rotary Club guardians and other club members whose efforts made the Honor Flight possible.

Following is a letter -- one of many received thanking Rotary for the trip -- that summed up what the day meant to one veteran and his daughter:

To the Tuscaloosa Rotary Honor Flight Committee:

On behalf of my father Charles Bonner and myself, I would like to thank you for the honor and privilege of being a part of the Tuscaloosa Rotary Honor Flight.

I can only describe it as a day that will forever own a piece of my heart and soul. The attention and respect given to the planning and execution of this trip was astounding. It was clear to see that even the smallest of details were decided with consideration and honor for our veterans.

To visit the memorials is an honor all its own. To visit them with veterans brings about a spirit of emotion that is extremely humbling and rewarding.

While touring Arlington Cemetery you could see on the faces of our veterans that they understood and felt the meaning of each and every one of the lives that had been lost. During the silence of the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, you knew your were surrounded by men and women that had made sacrifices of their own without hesitation or forethought of what it might cost them in their own lives.

To be able to openly pray and sing with these veterans was a privilege. As the tears rolled down my face

while singing God Bless America, I knew in my heart it would never sound more beautiful than at that moment. Thank you again for this honor.
